
HOLIDAY HANDBOOK

Your Essential Guide to Safety Abroad







We really want you to enjoy your holiday, so to help you stay safe when abroad, The Camping and Caravanning Club are working in association with Aria Assistance (previously Europ Assistance) to bring you an essential guide to help you prepare for your holiday and highlight potential issues so that you can avoid them. These precautions will help to protect you, your family and your possessions while you are away.

Driving abroad

The high mileages you are likely to cover on the continent may put a strain on your car, so to reduce the possibility of breakdown there are a few things you should do:

- Arrange a full service, in good time, before departure, paying particular attention to the following parts: battery, tyres, brake systems and linings, cooling system, water hoses and fittings and fan belt.
- Ensure that you take appropriate equipment to comply with local law such as a high visibility vests, warning triangle, beam deflectors, spare bulbs and NF approved Alcotest Breathalyzers when travelling in France.
- Do not overload your car.
- Plan your route ahead and ensure that a member of the party other than the driver is familiar
 with the route.
- Do not allow your fuel tank to run low and stay on well-lit and well-travelled roads.
- If you get lost in an unknown area on foot or in a vehicle ask for directions only from
 officials or proprietors of larger businesses e.g., hotels, garages, etc.
- Holiday motor breakdown insurance is invaluable when travelling abroad. Always keep
 your Breakdown Insurance documents with you when travelling as you will need to call
 the emergency telephone number shown in this if you need assistance.
- Make sure you have told your UK Motor Insurer that you are taking your car abroad so that they can extend your cover during your trip.
- If you break down on a motorway in France, Italy or Switzerland, before calling your vehicle breakdown insurer you need to use the motorway emergency phones to call the police and arrange for the vehicle to be towed off the motorway (only police-authorised breakdown vehicles are permitted to remove cars from the motorway in these countries).
- You should never leave valuables in an unattended car and you should always keep them out
 of sight, whether on your person or in the car.
- You may be particularly vulnerable when entering or leaving your car. Look inside your car before opening it and be aware of anyone loitering in the vicinity; if in doubt, walk past and find help.
- Beware of intruders gaining access to your car via open doors and windows whilst stationary.
 It is generally best to travel with all doors locked from the inside particularly in built-up areas.
- Avoid parking in poorly lit or vulnerable areas. It is not advisable to sleep in your car or to stay
 overnight in lay-bys or rest areas, particularly as thefts from overnighting vehicles is becoming
 increasingly common.
- Do not stop for anyone other than the police. In Spain it is not uncommon for foreign
 motorists to be flagged down by robbers posing as motorists in distress, or even as police
 officers. If in doubt, continue to the next service area before stopping. If you do have to stop
 lock your car doors as soon as you step out of the vehicle and make sure handbags/valuables
 cannot easily be snatched.

Ferry/Eurotunnel travel

At the start of your holiday leave in good time to travel to your UK departure point to ensure you arrive on time allowing for any traffic delays. When boarding your ferry/Eurotunnel service follow the directions of the company's staff who will direct you to your parking space.

- Be prepared to remain patient, as sometimes delays do occur.
- When walking around a ferry, particularly on the vehicle decks and in the washrooms, watch
 out for raised surfaces and doorsteps.
- Pay attention to emergency evacuation procedures given on all ferry/Eurotunnel services.

Personal safety and care

For your own personal safety it is advisable to carry as little cash as possible; credit cards or foreign currency cards are widely accepted and provide a more secure means of meeting your holiday expenditure. Traveller's cheques are less widely accepted now. Make a note of your credit card or foreign currency card numbers, and the contact phone numbers for reporting lost or stolen cards, and keep these details in a safe place, separate from your cards.

- Children remain the responsibility of their parents at all times. Be sure to always accompany
 any small children in your party. Also make sure that your children know where you are
 staying and the number of the pitch you are on.
- If you have access to a safe/safety deposit box make sure you keep your valuables in it.
 Your insurance may only provide cover in circumstances where money is stolen either from
 your person or from a locked safety deposit box/safe. You will need to obtain a police report if
 property is lost or stolen. Please leave valuables at home.
- Keep a careful note of which belongings you have with you and check regularly to make sure that none are missing.
- Report anything suspicious to camp site/hotel staff, or local police.
- Be sure to lock doors and close windows when you leave your car, caravan or motor home and secure your tent.
- Be particularly vigilant if out and about after dark.
- Always carry emergency telephone numbers to contact should the need arise.



Around the camp site

Once you are settled on your pitch you should familiarise yourself with the layout of the camp site. Aspects included in this are:

- Locate the nearest fire-fighting equipment.
- Find out site evacuation procedures.
- Locate the nearest telephone and emergency numbers.
- Be aware of sources of electricity and cabling on and around your pitch.
- Where regulations permit the use of charcoal BBQs, take the following precautions to prevent fire:
 - locate your BBQ away from hedges and accommodation.
 - have a bucket of water at hand in case the BBQ sparks or anyone burns themself.
 - Only use recommended fire lighting material.
 - Do not leave the BBQ unattended when lit.
 - Keep children away from the BBQ.
 - Allow ashes to cool completely before disposing of them.
- Carbon monoxide poisoning
 - Ensure your caravan/motorhome is fitted with a carbon monoxide alarm
 - Never bring a barbecue or fire inside this includes tents and awnings
 - Carbon monoxide alarms may not be fitted in rented accommodation on foreign campsites as it is not a legal requirement yet in some countries.
- Ensure you and your family take care on slippery surfaces particularly in showers, wash blocks and at swimming pools.





Mobile homes and chalets

In mobile homes you should follow the same procedures as in a caravan. Ensure that all gas and electrical appliances are switched off at night and when leaving the mobile home/chalet to go out.

• Ensure you lock all doors and close windows when going out.

Swimming Pools

Make the first visit to the pool area together with your children. Even if you have visited the site before, the layout may have changed, so check the following:

- · Pool layout identify shallow and deep ends.
- Check for any underwater features such as submerged rocks.
 Be careful when swimming and do not dive.
- Check the clarity of the water, if you cannot see the bottom of the pool, do not go in and inform reception immediately.
- Are there restrictions about diving, running and jumping in the pool?
 Are some surfaces slippery when wet?
- Check opening and closing times, and note any times the pool is not supervised (for example, over lunch).
- Note the position of safety equipment.
- Establish your own rules about parental supervision what may your children do with
 or without you being present. Age and swimming ability are important considerations
 here. At least one responsible adult should accompany and supervise children in the
 pool at all times.
- Remember; do not swim just after a meal, nor (adults please note) after drinking alcohol.
- Remember that in general it is not permitted to wear Bermuda shorts and T-shirts in camp site swimming pools, only traditional swimming trunks and swimsuits. A few campsites may insist on the use of swimming caps.

Children at play

- Ensure that your children are familiar with the camp site layout and they know where
 your unit is situated along with your pitch number.
- Remind your children about the Green Cross Code and encourage them to use it remember where vehicles drive on the right!
- · Look out for children when driving around the site and observe speed limits.
- Make sure that children are told of any places that they shouldn't go, including short cuts across other campers' pitches.
- Be aware that children's play areas are usually unsupervised.
- Check that the activities within the play area are suitable for your child's age and ability.
- Be aware of any campsite rules concerning ball games or use of play equipment like roller-skates, skateboards and bicycles.
- Be aware of any unfenced water on site, such as lakes and fishing ponds.



- Some sites offer a bike hire service, it is advisable to bring riding helmets if you intend to cycle as they are not always provided.
- · Some sites have farm animals. Be aware that some animals bite so be cautious and supervise children at all times.
- On sites where horse riding is offered, satisfy yourself with the rules and regulations: riding hats are not always provided. Riding horses without a suitable hat should not be undertaken.



- Always wear an adequate sunscreen, even if it is cloudy.
- Take a parasol or something to provide shade, especially for young children.
- Drink plenty of water or soft drinks alcohol, tea and coffee only increase dehydration.
- Know the location of any safety apparatus or lifeguards.
- Familiarise yourself with tides, currents and off-land winds before you or your children swim in the sea and never use inflatables in the sea.
- Check for any warning signs or flags before you swim.
- Use the designated areas for swimming, jet skiing, windsurfing etc.
- Swim in supervised areas wherever possible.
