Each pupil who completes the challenge will get a certificate and there are also lots of prizes up for grabs, including a night's camping at Twycross Zoo for selected pupils from winning schools.

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# Choose five activities from the list below:

- 1. Climb a tree
- 2. Roll down a hill
- 3. Build a den
- 4. Skim a stone
- 5. Dance in the rain
- 6. Fly a kite
- 7. Go tadpoling
- 8. Eat a meal outside
- 9. Play hide and seek outside
- 10. Go on a long bike ride
- 11. Make a mud pie

### 12. Play mud bullseye

Draw a bullseye on a designated area and take it in turns to try and hit the bullseye with your mud balls!

- 13. Have a tug of war over a patch of mud
- 14. Make a daisy chain
- 15. Create some wild art
- 16. Play pooh sticks
- 17. Go paddling

- 18. Have a treasure hunt
- 19. Visit a petting zoo or farm
- 20. Make a grass trumpet
- 21. Use binoculars or a telescope
- 22. Climb a huge hill

### 23. Hold a scary beast

This could be a spider, a slug, or any other kind of creepy crawly...

- 24. Find animal tracks
- 25. Identify an animal print
- 26. Make a bird feeder
- 27. Go on a spooky torchlit walk
- 28. Find your school on a map
- 29. Use a book to identify a plant/tree/animal
- 30. Play rounders
- 31. Try welly wanging
- 32. Learn to tie a rope knot
- 33. Make a bow and arrow from sticks
- 34. Weave or plait with a natural material

- 35. Pitch a tent with friends or family
- 36. Sing a song
- 37. Do five cartwheels in a row
- 38. Go on an adventure and write a story about it
- 39. Have a sack race
- 40. Have an egg and spoon race

### 41. Design a pennon

A pennon is a small triangular-shaped flag that campers put up next to their pitches

- 42. Find the oldest grave in a graveyard
- 43. Do some bark rubbing
- 44. Paint a stone and use it as a paperweight
- 45. Identify a star constellation
- 46. Do the washing up

### 47. Lower the caravan steadies

If you don't know anyone with a caravan, ask your local caravan dealer if they will let you give this a go

- 48. Take a dog for a walk
- 49. Work out which way the wind is coming from
- 50. Go cloud spotting

# Camping really is kids' stuff!

Here are some key facts from The Camping and Caravanning Club and Plymouth University's significant 2015 research piece, 'What do children learn when camping?'

- Children who camp in the outdoors at least once a year go on to do better at school, as well as being healthier and happier, according to their parents
- 4 out of 5 parents say camping had a positive effect on their children's school education
- The top 5 national curriculum subjects better understood by camping: Geography, Science, History, English, Maths
- 98% of parents said camping makes their kids appreciate and connect with nature
- 95% said their kids were happier when camping
- 93% felt that it provided useful skills for later life
- 52% of tent campers felt cooking when camping had a positive effect on their children's learning

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
